It is always nice to have one of our members volunteer to do a presentation. At the October meeting, Dr. Evan Blonder demonstrated how even a first time user could create an excellent presentation using *Keynote*.

Appropriately, he described how to get started by choosing a theme or creating your own. He described using the *Snap To* guide to help in laying out your presentation, and how to use the *Inspector* (a *Keynote* tool for controlling graphics, text, tables, charts etc.) to format different aspects of your presentation. He also explained that you can add audio and video to your presentation. Dr. Blonder made it a point to explain that you can save your *Keynote* presentation as a *PowerPoint* presentation, and it can be shown on a Mac or *Windows* computer. He also noted, that you can save your presentation as a *QuickTime* movie, so it can be viewed on a computer that does not have *Keynote* or *PowerPoint* Installed. Lastly, Dr. Blonder showed his presentation – it was the first presentation he made using *Keynote* and it only took him about three hours to prepare.

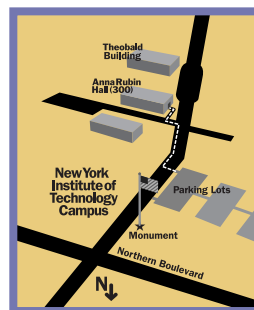

**TidBITS Troubleshooting Primer, Part 2**

Or perhaps you simply didn't think of the necessary tests. For instance, in last week's example of not being able to share files between a wireless-enabled computer and a wired computer connected to the same access point, if you didn't realize that all the traffic had to pass through the access point, and a factory default

reset (perhaps caused by a lightning strike-driven power surge) had turned off wireless to wired Ethernet bridging, you could easily have tested everything else without realizing what you were missing.

This is where experts come in. Sometimes they may have solved so many problems that they automatically know the solution to your problem based on your description. But more often they can simply break the problem down

into more chunks, one of which usually turns out to be the problem.

Intermittent problems can really drive you crazy when it comes time to seek expert help. Although an expert can offer suggestions about where to look, if you have a system that works some of the time, it's very difficult to determine whether you were testing the wrong variables or if you were testing the right variables at the wrong time or in combination with the wrong set

of other variables.

Where should you turn first? Give the order in which you jump from expert to expert some thought, since your goal should be to find a solution to your problem with the least effort and cost.

**Search the Web** Before anything else, try searching on the Web, both in company support databases and just generally in Google. The only hard part is coming up with appropriate search

**Bradley's Tech Session**

► **I want to buy the Canon i860 printer. I want to connect it to my beige Mac with a USB card. I'm told the printer does not work with non-native USB. So what should I do?**

Get a new Mac or an discontinued older printer with a serial port. The other solution is to get a printer with a *Ethernet* connection. Canon has no networkable bubblejet printers, but Hewlett Packard makes the DeskJet 6127 with built-in *Ethernet* and duplex printing for \$249 list. There is a \$50 rebate now till the end of the month, so it's only about \$50 more than the Canon you can't use anyway. You need *Mac OS 8.6* or newer and an *Ethernet* crossover cable to connect to it directly or a *Ethernet* hub and 3 standard patch cables to share it with another Mac. Printer will work just via *USB* or *Ethernet* when you do get a newer Mac running *OS X*. Epson sells their EpsonNet 10/100 Base-TX External Print Server for network access to a wide array of their inkjet printers plus you can still buy the Stylus C82N for \$249 list which includes the external *Ethernet* print server. It has the water and fade resistant DuraBrite inks, and separate ink cartridges and prints rather fast. The C82N even works with *Mac OS 8.5.1*, but it also works in *Jaguar*, aka *Mac OS 10.2*.

► **I seem to have deleted my copy of Sherlock under Mac OS 10.1.5 and I don't have a backup. Does Apple allow you to download this? I tried to reinstall Mac OS 10.1 but it complained about languages.**

You can't download *Sherlock*. The Apple installer won't run as you have updated past *10.1.0*. You can try using the \$20 shareware *Pacifist* to just install *Sherlock* rather than starting off the *10.1 CD* and doing the whole archive-and-install deal. *CharlesSoft* makes it and also the very useful *BootCD*.

► **Optimum Online offers software to remove spyware, but it's only for Windows machines. What can you use on a Mac?**

The commercial *Aladdin Internet Cleanup* (\$30) can be used or try the free *MacScan b8* from SecureMac. Both work in either *Mac OS 9* or *Mac OS 10*. There really isn't any spyware or malware for the Mac, but to be sure, these are functional and *Internet Cleanup* has far more useful features like a banner ad and pop-up

► **I have a G4 with a second IDE hard drive with a lot of data on it. I have a G5 on order. How do I transfer the files? Can I put the drive into the G5?**

No. The G5 only accepts serial ATA drives, not the parallel ATA drives Apple has used since the beige G3. You may see SATA adapters sold, but they are not supported. I would first suggest copying what you can from the second drive to the first drive and using a pin-to-6-pin *FireWire* cable, connect the G4 to the G5. Start the G4 with the T key held down to put it in *FireWire* target disk mode and then copy things from the first drive. The second drive will not show up. Do not put the G5 in *FireWire Target Disk Mode*, as it would make too much noise. All the fans would run at full speed. You can also turn on *Personal File Sharing* on the G4, share both drives, and *Connect to Server* from the G5's *Finder* and transfer files to the G5 through your cable router/hub. This will take far longer as *FireWire* is much faster. Even the double copying from the G4 to an external *FireWire* drive and then again from the external drive

**Protect your documents using snapshots in Photoshop:**

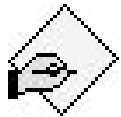
Have you ever had your image at that almost perfect stage and then tried a few more filters, making it look worse than it did initially? Well, if you had taken a snapshot of the image when it was looking good, then you could quickly go back and start again.

In order to take a snapshot, go to the *History* palette and click the *Create New Snapshot* button. Then you have a saved version of your image at that point to go back to just in case. You might even want to make multiple snapshots after you make any significant changes for added security. After all, it's better to be safe than sorry.

**Removing scratches from your shiny new iPod:**

If you've purchased an iPod you know the feeling of awe you had when you examined the shiny surface, marveling over the sleekness of the design. And you probably freaked a few weeks later when you began noticing tiny scratches all over the case. Yes, though the design is impressive, the metal isn't what one would call impervious to scuffs.

But before you begin lamenting over the marred surface, stop by your local hardware store and get a small bottle of Brasso. This brass polish, which comes in both fluid and wadding, will smooth out the scratches and make it nice and shiny again.



terms, but it's worth five minutes of searching if it reveals the answer you need. You wouldn't believe the number of questions we've received over the years whose answers were easily found in Google (since that's where I look first, too). [www.google.com/](http://www.google.com/).

Of course, if you have any books or magazine articles that touch on the topic, it's worth looking in them as well, though I usually search on the Web first, since it's faster than flipping

through an index or scanning multiple issues of a magazine.

**Ask an Expert Friend** If a Web search doesn't turn up an answer, or at least some new tests to try, the fastest, cheapest, and easiest person to ask for help is a friend who is an expert at the topic in question. If you have such a friend, I recommend asking that person for help next. Be careful, though, because overusing a friend's willingness to answer your technical questions

or fix your problems can strain otherwise solid friendships. And if the friend is really more of an acquaintance, even more care is warranted to avoid causing irritation.

If possible, try to perform roughly equivalent favors so your friend doesn't feel exploited. Tonya and I even have a "friend consulting rate" for computer help: dinner. That way, the event changes from a consulting visit into a social event with friends, and everyone feels appropri-

ately rewarded.

**Contact Tech Support** If you don't have an expert friend, the next best option is to contact the technical support department run by the manufacturer of the hardware or software in question. If you haven't already done so, visit their Web site and search quickly to see if they have an online database of problems and solutions that can solve your problem instantly.

## TIPS!

### Avoid accidentally quitting applications:

One of the nicest additions to Safari, Apple's slick new browser, is the ability to open new windows in links. However, if you've used the technique for anytime at all, you've probably accidentally hit the **Command-Q** key combo causing the application to quit instead of the **Command-W** key command used to close a tab. To say the least, this can be very frustrating. Fortunately, there's a way you can disable the **Command-Q** key command. That way your less-than-nimble fingers won't be able to make the mistake again.

To disable the **Quit** key command, launch the **Terminal** application and enter the following as a single line of text: `defaults write NSGlobalDomain NSUserKeyEquivalents '{"Quit Safari"="@Q;"}`

Now, press the **Enter** key and launch Safari. When you choose the **Apple** menu, you'll discover that your **Quit** menu key command has changed to **Command-Shift Q**. Pressing the

to the G5 would be faster. One little thing that I found while moving from a G4 to the G5 is your *Apple PlainTalk* microphone won't work, so I found a M-560 Telex USB microphone that should do nicely for voice recognition, recording new system beeps or voice-overs in *iMovie*. See [www.telex.com/computeraudio/products.nsf/pages/M-560](http://www.telex.com/computeraudio/products.nsf/pages/M-560). I also had to buy a USB Zip drive and an ADC-to-VGA adapter cable to support my second monitor. The video card has a different complement of connectors than the one I had in the G4. Most people with just one monitor won't have any problem as the card has an ADC and a DVI port, plus it comes with a DVI-to-VGA adapter, to support everything but an old Apple-specific monitor. One other thing to note for people making a similar move, if you had an inexpensive SCSI PCI card in the G4, it won't work in the G5, as it needs a 3.3V-compatible card. They start at \$299 for an Adaptec PowerDomain 29160N card, which has a high density 50-pin narrow SCSI-2 connector on the back. You won't be able to route an internal SCSI cable to a internal SCSI hard drive. You'll find external *FireWire 800* hard drives to be almost as fast as the internal SATA drive that comes with the G5. You'll need a card like this to support your favorite high end SCSI scanner.

► **Looking for a easy to use Web page authoring software, since Adobe PageMill has been long discontinued. I need more than what's possible in a word processor export function.**

Softpress's *Freeway Express* is about \$99 and is advertised to be targeted as beginners. They also have a Pro version for \$239 or \$199 for a competitive upgrade. It may have the edge for some people in that it works in *Mac OS 9* as well as *OS X*. These are new 2003 generations of their previous single release *Freeway 3.5.6*. Apple has been promoting to *Mac* members the new and similarly priced but *OS X*-only *Macromedia Contribute 2*. There was a *Windows*-only version of *Contribute 1*, and now they have a *Mac* version. You can download trial versions of either to see which works better for you. Of course the professional crowd, looking for a WYSIWYG Web authoring package would use either *Adobe Golive* or *Macromedia's Dreamweaver*. In another vein,

page layout programs like *Adobe InDesign 2* or *QuarkXPress 6* can export as HTML, so you can consider having either of these as killing two birds with one stone.

► **I see that the new Aladdin Stuffit Deluxe 8 offers backup software as well as Dantz's Retrospect Express and Carbon Copy Cloner. Are they all OK?**

Only *Carbon Copy Cloner* can make a bootable copy of your hard drive onto another hard drive, but if you don't have a second drive to boot from in case of disaster, then at least you can restore selected bits that may become damaged or deleted accidentally. This is worthwhile but not as useful as a bootable disk. The fact that the new *Stuffit Deluxe* can backup to CD-R or DVD-R using the *Archive Assistant* is limited to the contents of your *Home* folder, so if you delete an application accidentally, it won't help you unless you take the exceptional measure of moving your programs to the *Applications* folder in your *Home* folder from the usual *Applications* folder in your root directory on your startup drive. ↴

### Drop Stuff to the Rescue.

Have you ever had a file that just can't be thrown away? A new Apple Knowledge Base (KBase #107426) article discusses how to delete an incomplete copy or download. One method to remove "undeletable" files is a throwback to *Classic* and requires the use of Aladdin's *StuffIt Standard Edition*, which is available as a free download (i.e. you'll be reminded to register every time you use it).

Since November I have had a file on my desktop that just refused to be thrown away. I tried renaming the file, locking and unlocking, etc., to no avail. The *Finder* just kept repeating that the file was busy. However, last week (yes, just a few days before Apple posted the above-mentioned KBase article) I remembered an old *OS 7* trick I used years ago: Open *Drop Stuff*, open the *Preferences* and select *delete original item after stuffing*, close *Preferences*, drag the undeletable file onto the *Drop Stuff* window and the original will be gone, and you can safely delete the resulting compressed file. ↴

### Quickly expand a couple of Finder levels:

If you're in *View By Name* mode in the *Finder* and want to quickly expand a couple of levels within the folders, hold down the **Option-Command** keys as you click on the toggle triangle. When you do so, your *Mac* expands the folders by two levels. —Element K Journals

We were very lucky this time that we didn't try soon enough to get the update. By the time we tried, the update had been recalled. I'm not sure just what didn't work, but we didn't have to worry about it. We did get the newly released and repaired v10.2.8 file but haven't yet installed it. I've heard at several Mac meetings, that one should not rush to upgrade.

As a contradiction to the above paragraph. We are eagerly awaiting Panther, OS X 10.3. What it will have for us is a real conundrum. Do we need it? Is it going to help? At this point, it seems to me that flipping back and forth to multiple open applications is the main advantage. I want Photoshop Elements 2 since I think it's the greatest program in the world. It requires OS 9.1 as a minimum operating system, but it is so far superior to Elements 1, that I felt it was worth the struggle. I added two 256MG chips and planned to upgrade this computer to OS X as well. My plans of course pay no attention to reality. In order to install OS X, I need to clear out my hard drive and then re-initialize it as HFS plus. Not worth it. I am now living with the old Microsoft Word, but I can use PhotoShop Elements 2. Unfortunately, as a Classic app, Quark cannot see the new Distiller 6.0 application package, which only runs under Mac OS X, as a usable version of Distiller.
