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July's/August's Meetings

At our July meeting Bradley showcased several standard and downloaded *Widgets* for *Dashboard*, a new feature of *Mac OS X 10.4 Tiger*. *Mac OS 10.4.2* added a *Widget* manager. *Widgets* can be decorative or not really useful, like the *Yoda-Talk Widget* or handy like the *Gas Widget* (from www.gaspricewatch.com), *TV Tracker Widget* and the *Package Tracker Widget*. Many *Widgets* just duplicate the functions available on a Web site and the modal use of *Dashboard* makes their usefulness limited, but the one-click access to many at once is handy. Bradley's not convinced *Dashboard* is enough to justify the price to upgrade to *Tiger*. *Widgets* can be downloaded from: www.apple.com/downloads/dashboard and www.dashboardwidgets.com.

Al Choy demonstrated some useful strategies when searching the Web such as boolean and string searches; then some not so obvious Google features such as package tracking, phone searches, mathematical expressions, tracking of airline flights and so on.

Jon Levy previewed some new features that may be incorporated into the future redesign of our Web site. These were presented both from the user's perspective and the webmaster's. The Web site will use Bloxom to keep files in chronological order as well as by topic, and produces RSS feeds for fast access to the latest LIMac news. LIMac members have helped to improve the site with their comments, requests, and criticism. When finished, our LIMac Web site will have a distinctive look and feel.



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A Note From The Editor:

It all started as a glitch in which my iMac needed to be restarted in order to continue to function. Then it became a problem to simply open. And finally it died.

But then this story began.

I had my iMacG5 since 23 October, 2004. I loved it. It was more fun than the G5 Desktop I already had. I liked the way it looked, sounded and performed – even before I got it. I did the

Forum with it. And used it for all my client's work. It had a wonderful, easy-to-read monitor. But that day it failed: I pushed the button behind the unit and got a blank stare from it.

After a morning of trying every fix I knew or read about, I gave up. (I'm very self-reliant and hate to call and ask for help. But this time I knew it was necessary). I called AppleCare (I was smart enough to buy three years of AppleCare, plus ProCare and still had the original warranty to fall back on).

Nice people. Together we consumed about two hours of seeking repairs. They showed me four or five testing tricks I never knew existed (and I've been at this Mac System since 1992). They all failed and I was told to bring the iMac in to the Apple Store of my choice (Roosevelt Field).

Off we went (Loretta and me-and the iMac in its original carton mounted on a dolly – no one could hope to carry an iMac the distance between the parking lot and the Apple Store unless they were on steroids!).

When I entered the Apple store and paraded down the main aisle with my "cartoned" computer, I got strange looks from the people at the "Genius" counter (to which I was directed). By that time I had a "Case Number" and was already in scrutiny by the Apple system.

Preliminary tests were conducted by a very competent "Genius" with earphones and other paraphernalia.

"Leave it with us!" I was told. They had decided that my problems were with either the



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**TIPS!****Easy reminder for Safari keyboard shortcuts:**

Virtually every application that runs on Mac OS X has a set of shortcut keys to help you save a little time along the way. Unfortunately, most don't provide a simple way to review these shortcuts. So, you either print out the shortcuts hoping you don't misplace the printout, or you just use the ones you remember. But if you're using Safari and want to bone up on the keyboard shortcuts available, just enter the following into the address field:

`file://Applications/Safari.pp/Contents/Resources/Shortcuts.html`

When you do, Safari looks deep into its resource files and displays a page complete with shortcuts. Since you might not remember the address the next

Bradley's Tech Session

► **I've got a router and a Airport base station, but I need more ports for more network connected computers and printers. Can you recommend a router with more than 8 ports?**

Most wired or wireless routers have 4 ports. Linksys makes a nice 8-port wired router, the BEFSR81. If you need more ports then all you need to do it buy a 4-, 5-, 8-, 12-, or 16-port hub or switch. (Larger switches for bigger offices are usually rack mounted.) I'd avoid hubs as they have to share the bandwidth for simultaneous connections, where switches offer full point to point speed and the switches aren't much more money nowadays. The modern switches offer auto-switching ports, sometimes referred as n-way. Otherwise you need a cross-over cable to connect the router to the switch or a regular patch cable if the router or switch has a port labeled uplink. Most routers and switches have link integrity lights, so you know immediately if your connection is good. You can daisy-chain a network with up to 5 switches between any two devices. One more thing, most switches nowadays are 100Mbps *Fast Ethernet*, sometimes shortened to *EtherFast*.® If you are networking modern Macs with 1000Mbps *Ethernet*, use a gigabit *Ethernet* switch (like the 8-port Linksys EG008W or NETGEAR® GS608) to avoid slowdowns in file transfers. Important for good gigabit speed connections, use category 5e or "High Performance" CAT6 UTP (Unshielded Twisted Pair) cables. I'd label the switch to keep it clear what device plugs into what port. Color coded cables are useful in complex interconnects. Your setup has a major problem. You can't have two DHCP servers on one network. I'm going to assume you have the cable or DSL modem going to the router and not to the Airport base station. You have to disable the DHCP server in the Airport base station. This would make the Airport base station a plain wireless access point. Just use the *Airport Admin. Utility* to change it's setup and it should work. This is done in the *Network* tab, turn off the check-box for *Distribute IP addresses* and click the *Update* button.

printer? It uses one picoliter droplets. I currently have a Epson Stylus Photo 1200.

As commendable as that is, it should offer very smooth and detailed prints. It offers duplex printing via it's second paper source. That's a rare and new feature for Canon. It uses 5 separate *ContrastPLUS* inks (dye-based CMYK plus pigment black) which is good for everyday business-class printing, but what I find more interesting is their PIXMA iP8500 Photo Printer which uses 8 inks. The smoother graduations and wider color gamut (because of the addition of red and green inks) offered by *ChromaPLUS* make it a better photo printer. It also offers the duplex printing, but the 8500 is almost twice the price of the 5000. The 5000 is faster printing simple pages than the 8500, but the 8500 offers USB 2.0 support to handle the large files photographers would be sending to this printer. It all depends on what's more important to you, but I tend to use a inkjet printer for photo printing. One more thing, Canon printers tend to be trouble free com- (Q&A continues on Page 3.)

Reset dialog box settings in Adobe InDesign:

Have you ever entered settings in a dialog box in *InDesign* and, after looking at the preview, realize you need to start over again? Of course you have! Who hasn't? Rather than clicking the *Cancel* button, though, you can simply hold down the *Option* key in several of the dialog boxes in *InDesign* to change the *Cancel* button to the *Reset* button. Click the *Reset* button to clear the fields and enter new settings. It sure beats having to repeatedly reopen a dialog box!

logic board or the power pack.

We went home.

I write this on my new iMac using a 2 GHz CPU, 1.5 GB memory, iTunes blasting bluegrass and all the new specifications (a lot) I didn't have in the first computer. I still love the iMac G5. I'm very happy with the help I got and the final decisions by the AppleCare and Roosevelt Field Apple Store Gurus, "Genius" Michael Gehrig and "Lead Mac Genius" Max Magee.

I was also happy with the quick, easy transposition of my 3-year AppleCare program to the new iMac (accomplished with ease via a 1-800 phone call to Apple).

All-in-all, Apple performed better than any other company I have ever used in my computer life. Steve Jobs should be proud of these loyal experts (not just in their technical expertise, but in their human interplay).

TIPS!

Apple quietly releases font tools for Mac OS X (Terminal):

In what appears to be a secret release, Apple has made a complete suite of font tools available to anyone using Mac OS X in April of last year. The only reason we figure they haven't publicized it is the tools are command line tools, meaning that you can only run them from the Terminal application. The free set of tools is available for download at <http://developer.apple.com/fonts/OSXTools.html>.

Once you've downloaded and installed the suite, you can run them by simply entering their command into a Terminal session. The following is a list of the commands and their function. For more information on each tool, view their help file by entering *man* before the command name in a Terminal session.

ftxanalyzer allows you to examine the glyph repertoire in case you need to add characters to the font table using a font-drawing application. **ftxdiff** lets you compare the contents of two versions of a font, one against the other.

pared to Epson printers, whose nozzle tend to clog more. Epson has always had the lead in color matching due to their color profiles and the driver software, but Canon has gotten very good on their photo printers. Canon inks tend to be reasonably priced, relative to the competition. The iP8500 should give serious challenge to the more expensive Epson Stylus Photo R800 unless you need printing onto inkjet printable CDs or DVDs, which is a Epson exclusive. If you want to replace the Epson SP1200 with a better model that prints on CDs, then consider the Stylus Photo R1800. Same 13x19 paper support, but 8 separate UltraChrome Hi-Gloss™ pigment inks. Cyan, Magenta, Yellow, Photo Black, Matte Black, Red, Blue, and Gloss Optimizer. Has USB 2.0 and FireWire ports. For just \$549 the print quality is unmatched. Archival prints with a 1.5 picoliter droplet mean microscopic grain. Just no automatic duplex, but it can print up to 44 inches long on roll paper. If the \$70 can only be used to buy a Canon printer, the have the tabloid-extra size i9900. USB 2.0 and FireWire ports and 2-picoliter, 8-color ChromaPlus ink droplets give nice smooth results. No duplex print as this is not a PIXMA series printer. Just a side note, if you are interested in printing on CDs, you have to buy special inkjet printable types, which are white or silvery on top. The usual variety which may have a logo or design on top or even blank on top will not support the printers. Also watch out for (and avoid) thermal printable CDs or DVDs, which are designed for use in special dye sublimation printers, which is a color thermal process. I've seen some very good printing on TDK brand media which I recommend in general for burning data anyway.

► I've got a first generation PowerMac G4 (PCI graphics) running OS 9. Can I install Mac OS X and Photoshop CS 2?

That machine meets the requirements for Mac OS 10.4.2 and Photoshop CS2, but of course the performance would not be very good. The machine supports a maximum of 1GB of RAM. Mac OS 10.4 wants 512MB of RAM and of course Photoshop wants five times the file size to edit CMYK images on top of it's core requirements of about 320MB, so you can see that even maxed out at 1GB, that would allow editing of only one good sized image. Of course Mac OS X and Photoshop use virtual memory if they don't

have enough real RAM. The final concern with a PCI PowerMac G4 is the available space on it's 10GB hard drive. Between Mac OS X and 9 and Photoshop CS 2 and the usual stuff most people have on their computer's hard drive, there may not be much space left. Keep in mind the general rule of leaving about 1GB free to print a full page to a inkjet printer. This machine supports larger IDE hard drives, up to 120GB.

► I go to many Web sites with video clips on them and I just get a broken plug-in icon. How can I fix this?

First off, you have to understand there are a few different video formats used on the Internet. I'd suggest downloading and installing RealPlayer and Windows Media Player and make sure you have the latest Flash and Shockwave plug-ins while you're at it. Run the updater for RealPlayer to get the latest bits for it. Use vlc (Video Lan Client) 0.82 for the .avi files you may come across. ↵

ftxdumperfuser dumps individual font tables in an easy to read XML file.

ftxenhancer used in conjunction with the *ftxanalyzer* to add some specialized tables to a font.

txinstalledfonts lists the fonts installed in your system.

The various options let you specify the font's PostScript names, unique names, full names, version (release names), and the location where the font is installed.

ftxruler provides a text dump of the metrics actually returned by the system in real life. This tool is useful for comparing different versions of the same font to make sure changes won't cause document reflow.

ftxvalidator inspects a given font file for errors.

Apple offers iMac G5 Repair Extension Program for Video and Power Issues:

Apple has announced the **iMac G5 Repair Extension Program for Video and Power Issues**, which applies to first generation iMac G5 computers that have video or power-related issues as a result of a specific component failure.

These issues have been extensively documented on *MacFixIt*:

- ▶ **iMac G5: White streaks appearing on bottom of display** – possibly related to power supply issues
- ▶ **iMore on iMac G5 power supply burnout**: Bad capacitors seem to be at fault
- ▶ **iMac G5 power supply burnout**: New (Ambient Light Sensor) models less affected
- ▶ **iMac G5: Power Supply Burnout/Component failure due to overheating**
If your iMac G5 is exhibiting any of the symptoms

listed below and your computer's serial number is within the noted ranges, your computer may be eligible for repair, free of charge. If Apple or an Apple Authorized Service Provider (AASP) determines that your iMac G5 computer is eligible as part of the program, the repair will be covered by Apple for up to two years from the original date of purchase even if your iMac G5 is out of warranty. This is a worldwide Apple program.

Affected systems will exhibit one of the following video- or power-related symptoms:

- ▶ Scrambled or distorted video
- ▶ No video
- ▶ No power

The program covers only certain iMac G5 models that were sold between approximately September 2004 and June 2005 featuring 17- and 20-inch displays with 1.6GHz and

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TIP!

Drag and drop color in InDesign:

It seems so obvious, but it's easy to forget that *InDesign* allows us to drag and drop colors defined in the *Swatches* palette to page items. We can even format table cells and cell borders this way.

Simply display the *Swatches* palette (F5) and drag a color from the *Swatches* palette to the item. Make sure the *Hand* icon with the plus sign (+) is directly over the area you want to color. Then, release your mouse button to apply it. For multiple applications, click the *Eyedropper* tool on the item to sample its stroke and fill attributes. Then, click on the target items to format them similarly.

The 11-digit serial number is located on a label under the foot of the iMac G5. There is a bar code underneath the serial number. To view the label, hold the sides of the iMac and gently lay the computer face down on a soft, clean towel or cloth. ▶

TIPS!

Add an item to the Login Items list?

There are at least 3 ways to manually add a new Login Item to the list:

1. Add it from the *Login Items* window. From the *Login Items* window in the *Accounts* pane, click the *Add (+)* button at the bottom of the window. An *Add* sheet will drop down. Navigate to the file you want to select and click the *Add* button.

Alternatively, you can simply drag a file's icon from its *Finder* window to the *Login Items* list.

2. Add it from the *Dock*. If the item is currently in the *Dock*, click-hold the icon to bring up its *Dock* menu. One of the items in the menu will be *Open at Login*. Select it.

3. Add it from the software's *Preferences* options. Some programs include an option to add themselves (or some related software) to the *Login Items* list. For

showed us three utilities that can help you get the most out of OS X. The first two utilities he demonstrated are freeware, so there is no reason not to have both of them. *Onyx* and *TinkerTool* do a lot of the same things, however each one does a trick or two that the other does not. Both of these can change the appearance of the *Finder*, *Safari* and *Address Book*. They can put arrows on top, bottom, and both sides of the scroll bars. These utilities also allow you to change the file format of the screen capture utility. They can control the behavior of the *Dock*, enable and disable *Dashboard*, and turn off some of the eye candy such as window zooming, disabling some of the bells and whistles that are really not necessary in getting work done, can speed up the interface on an older (slower) Mac. Another trick both of these can do, is enable the *Debug Menu* in *Safari*. This is a handy tool to have; it will allow you to view some otherwise unavailable sites. Both of these also allow you to verify and repair *Permissions*. Of the two, only *Onyx* can allow you to run *Cron Scripts* and empty *Caches*. *TinkerTool*, on the other hand, allows you to change certain system fonts while *Onyx* does not have this function.

Cocktail is not free, but the shareware fee is only \$15. It duplicates most of what the others do, but adds more automation control so you can set scripts to run automatically at the times you select. It also has a control to set window resize speed. Be careful though, there are specific versions of *Cocktail* for *Tiger*, *Panther*, and *Jaguar*. You can locate all of these utilities at www.versiontracker.com.

Installing Mac OS 9 (Classic) on a new iMac G5 loaded with Mac OS X 10.4:

The default Macintosh installation on some computers manufactured after June 2004 leaves *Classic* mode out in the cold, but the computer does come with the good old Mac OS 9.2.2 – it's just not pre-installed on the hard disk. This includes the iMac G5, Mac mini, and some Power Macintosh G5 computers. Dig out your documentation and software package out of the original box and find either the *Software Install and Restore DVD* or the *Additional Software & Apple Hardware Test DVD*. Insert the disc and double-click the *Install Applications & Classic Support* or *Install Extra Software* icon. Then follow the on screen instructions until you get to the screen with the *Customize* button at the bottom. Click *Customize*, check *Classic Support* and click *Install* to get the goods. -MacAddict

The LIMac Executive Board has decided to test drive online distribution of the FORUM. The September and October issues of the FORUM will be sent to you online and by "snail mail." After the test period, we will evaluate your comments and feedback. We will then decide on how to handle the future distribution of the FORUM. Below we list the pros and cons that entered into your executive board's decision to consider online distribution. We encourage your input.

Pros:

- 1. **No printing and distribution costs.** Since online distribution is free, we can save these costs each year. This money can be used to keep our equipment up to date.
- 2. **Less labor intensive.** Under our current system of distribution, a PDF copy of the FORUM is sent to the printer, it is printed and later picked up from the printer, a stamp and label is put on each copy, then they are brought to the post office for mailing.
