**November's Meeting**



Desmond Lee from Olympus came down, and brought a selection of digital cameras for us to examine. Unlike it's prime competitor, Nikon, Olympus makes a wide range of digital cameras because customers have a wide range of needs and therefore require a wide range of cameras at price points and feature compromises.



A good example would be the new C-2100UZ shown above on the left. It has a 10X optical zoom with optical image stabilization, but 2.1 megapixels.



Compare that to the C-3030 Zoom above on the right, with 3.34 megapixels, 3X zoom but fast 3.3 frames/sec sequence mode shooting.



Another specialty camera is the new C-211 Zoom printing camera which uses Polaroid type 500 film. Comes with 3X zoom with macro mode to 8 inches. 2.11 megapixels

is large enough for an 8- by 10-inch print back at the office.

Also featured in the discussion was the new Camedia E-10 4 megapixel SLR. At \$2000 list, it's a professional's camera, but it features a fast f2.0 lense especially designed for digital camera use, a pivoting display and can use both SmartMedia and CompactFlash cards. Real manual focus and a shutter lag of under 100 msec. Even a trusty hot shoe on top. An all-aluminum body means it's rugged and dissipates internally generated heat. It beats the Nikon D1 in features and price.

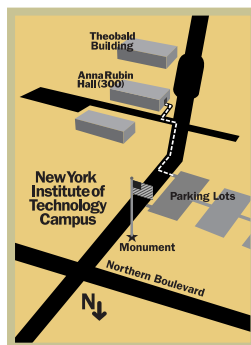

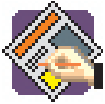

**TIP!**

**QXP 4: Tips'n'Tricks. A Miscellany:**

► *Creating View-Specific Guides:*  
*Shift-Drag* a guide from the ruler to make it visible at only that percentage view or greater (i.e., *Shift-Drag* a guide while at 200% view to make the guide visible only at 200% or above). To *Shift-Drag*, simply hold down the *Shift* key while you click on a ruler and drag out a guide. You can confirm that your guide is visible at only your current view percentage or higher by lowering the view percentage and looking for the newly created guide.

► *Unlinking a text box:*  
Unlink a text box from a story without breaking the story flow by *Shift-Unlinking* the box.

## Technical Corner

► **I got an advertisement from a car company in the form of a cut down mini-CD the size of a business card. Can I use that in my iMac or iBook?**

These discs are cut down to fit a business card's dimensions. They hold 50MB of data. The iBook, with its tray loading mechanism where the CD center hole snaps onto the spindle, can handle these as well as the small round CD-ROMs, but the slot loading iMac will likely never eject the disc and it would require service to get it out or replace the drive. The small 77 mm diameter round discs also will not work in the slot loading iMac. Only the full size 120mm discs will work. The G4 Cube would also have the same problem as the slot load iMac. The slot loading drive is unusual in the computer industry so manufacturer's using these discs as well as recordable versions are not aware of the problem. I see the *PokeROM* discs at the checkout corner of CompUSA and I notice they would work on the *Mac OS*, but be warned iMac buyers!

► **I'm running Mac OS 8.1 and I've recently added a lot more RAM and now the Mac takes a long time from the moment I press the Power Button to the time it starts up. I know it's testing the Memory. Is there any way to prevent it from taking so long?**

You would have to upgrade to *Mac OS 8.6* or newer to be able to use the trick of the *Memory Control Panel* to disable the *Memory Test*.

► **On my 400MHz PowerBook G3 (FireWire), is there a difference between the USB ports and between the FireWire ports?**

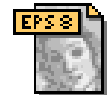
The *FireWire* ports are treated exactly the same, but *USB port 2*, the lower port, is the preferred one with higher priority. Best for external keyboards as it allows you to use the *Shift* or *C* keys to start up without *Extensions* or from a bootable CD.

► **Is the dual processor G4 worth it? I do imagesetter work.**

Then I would assume you do heavy *Photoshop* work, in which case I would say the dual 450MHz with Max RAM would be far better than 500MHz with not enough. The speed benefit, about 60% and the additional base RAM and bigger hard drive are worth the

**Control blends in Illustrator 8:**

In *Illustrator 8*, you can control a blend's rate of change by manipulating the direction points of its spine. Click the center of the blend with the *Direct Selection* tool, then select the *Convert Direction Point* tool and drag out the a control handle at each end of the spine. As you move these control handles, you will adjust the blend's rate of change.

**URL Manager Pro 2.5**

Are you constantly switching from *Netscape* to *Internet Explorer*? With the way browsers act these days you probably do a bunch of switching around. Unfortunately switching browsers isn't exactly the easiest thing to do. Mainly because you have to transfer bookmarks from one browser to another. It may be easy to do, but it becomes a real pain after awhile. *URL Manager Pro* solves that problem and offers some great enhancements.

*URL Manager Pro* manages all your bookmarks in one program. The reason I like *URL Manager Pro* the best is because of its interface. The program allows you to create folders for each category of your choice (i.e. Mac Websites). You then have the option of adding individual URL's to each folder. You can even add sub-folders. The program integrates with your current Web browser so you don't have to jump back and forth between applications to paste new URLs. The program also supports

the-mail, and ftp URL protocol. One of the nicer features of the bookmarking system is the ability to place notes with each URL. By highlighting a bookmark and pressing *Command-I*, you have the option to place your own notes about the selected site.

**Powerful Features:** *URL Manager Pro* offers loads of great features such as *History*. It keeps track of past sites that you visited. Another key feature of the program is *Bookmark Management*. On the Web, sites

come and go, and most people don't have the time to check their bookmarks regularly. *URL Manager Pro* can automatically check for dead URL's. The program also has a built in Net Search.

**TIP!****Use Retrospect for quick duplicates:**

*Retrospect* is used to automatically back up a computer to a tape drive or other removable media drive. But it also provides a very fast way to copy all data from one volume to another (much faster than using the *Finder*).

For example, files copied to a 100MB Zip cartridge using the *Finder*, proceeded at .5MB per minute. *Retrospect* copied the data at 6MB per minute—about 12 times faster. Use *Retrospect* to quickly duplicate one *Hard Drive* to another, then reformat the first *Hard Drive*, and use *Retrospect* to quickly copy the data back to it.

extra cost. *Mac OS X* will be able to allow one program to use processor A, while a second program will get processor B and never a slow down when a program is switched to the background or when your downloading or holding down the mouse button.

► **I have a G4 with font problems. I originally had Extensis Suitcase 8.2. A service installed 8.0 and removed Type Reunion. Every font is now open. It's a mess. What should I do?**

First, you could try downloading *Suitcase 8.2* with *MenuFonts 8.2.2* with the *MenuFonts* update. Then, with that installed, move your non-essential fonts from the *System Folder* and manage them with 8.2 with *MenuFonts 8.2.2*. If your G4 is running *Mac OS 9.0*, then you should upgrade to *Suitcase 9.0.1*.

Personally, I would toss *Suitcase* and *MenuFonts* and use *Adobe Type Manager Deluxe* and *Type Reunion Deluxe*. *ATM Deluxe* can auto-activate in any program, not just *Quark XPress*, plus it has dependable *Verify* and *Find Duplicates* functions. If you use *ATM Lite* with *Suitcase* or *ATM Deluxe* without, if your G4 is running *Mac OS 9*, it comes with an Extension called *Type 1 Scaler*, which needs to be removed. If you are using *Mac OS 9* and the *Multiple User* software to create a limited user, then *Suitcase 8.2* won't work and you'll have to use *Suitcase 9.0.1* (or better yet *ATM Deluxe 4.6.1*.)

► **I have a G4 450MHz using Mac OS 8.6. Every time a startup I have to go to the Chooser to select my Epson Stylus Color 600. Also the queue has stopped working—print jobs never get printed.**

Have you tried zapping the *Parameter RAM*? The *Stylus Color 600*'s software has not seen an update in two and a half years. You need a USB adapter to work it with a G4. You never will find peace with this printer. I would suggest replacing it with a cheap newer Epson like the \$99 *Stylus Color 777* which has native USB connection. You'll have to get a USB A to B cable to go with it. Consider moving up to a better printer in the Epson line, they all have USB now. The software is modern and you'll have far less problems with that. For people with older Macs that still had printer ports, the old Epson soft-

ware suffered the problem where it did not set the *PRAM* with the selected port. You had to use the *Apple StyleWriter* or *ImageWriter* software to pretend you had one of those connected to the *Printer* port, close the chooser, which set the *PRAM*, then open it again and choose your Epson printer. The only option besides this was to leave the printer on the modem port and connect your modem to the printer port and change the settings of your modem using software, like the *PPP/Remote Access* software, or AOL's setup. Very old pre-Power Macs would not support the swap, as the two serial ports were not interchangeable.

► **My G4 wakes up immediately after I tell it to go to sleep. What causes this?**

Usually it's a USB device being polled, so you could say it's some software—and it's some hardware. With the assumption it's a USB device, unplug all but the keyboard and mouse and tell the computer to sleep. If it stays asleep, then wake it up, plug in one USB device and try again. You should find the culprit. Often it's a scanner software (in the *Startup Items*) checking for a button press. I usually kill these and use the scanner conventionally. If the problem is software only, I would use *Conflict Catcher* or Apple's *Extensions Manager* to figure out which software is causing the problem. You may need to disable, downgrade or upgrade something. Yes, sometimes the latest is not the greatest. One other possibility is the power switch is faulty. If so, you may smell a burnt aroma. The G4 will have to go in for service. ↗

Now the problems: We must connect the *Airport* to the ISP with *Airport* software, which means we must bring along the portable each weekend. I was able to find a third-party software patch which lets me disconnect the *Airport* from the ISP, but cannot turn it on without the Apple software. That's my first question for Bradley. The second one is: Can I use a hub to attach more than one *Ethernet* cable to the *Airport* base? ↗

**TIPS!****Photoshop selection tips:**

► **Selection beyond edge of document when using the Lasso tool:**

You can hold the *Command* key to drag beyond the edge of your document and still make a selection.

► **Restrict selection to Image Boundaries:**  
To limit the selection to the edges of your image, choose *Select > Inverse* twice.

► **Saved selections:**  
If you are going to need to use a selection over and over again, then choose *Save Selection* from the *Select* menu.

► **To retrieve the selection later:** Choose *Load Selection* from the same menu. These saved selections will remain in the file as long as you use the *Photoshop* or *TIFF* file formats. To save the image in any other file format be sure to choose *File > Save A Copy*, otherwise the other file formats will not be available.

► **Control-Click:**  
You can access many of the commands that appear under the *Select* menu by *Control-Clicking* while using any of the selection tools.

## Sore Eyes

This is a good opportunity to discuss our experiences with *Airport*. Every time I open the computer section of the newspaper or look at another computer magazine, the discussion seems to revolve around wireless Internet connections. We use Apple's *Airport* and we think it is wonderful. It was not so easy to set up at first. However, now that Apple has updated *Airport* to *version 1.2*, there seem to be no difficulties, or at least very few.

We have an *Airport* card installed in the iBook with which we travel. This is a \$99 addition that is very easy to install. Just lift the keyboard and the built-in clip appears.

We have a base station set up in our house. This \$299 purchase allows us to take the portable any place within 150 feet of the base. *Airport* gets plugged into the telephone connection and that's it. *Airport* software on the portable allows us to connect to our ISP. We have used as many as five individual Macs with *Airport* cards at one time – all connected to the Internet; all doing different things at the same time. According to Apple, we can use up to ten.

We even have my G3 Desktop attached by *Ethernet* crossover cable to *Airport*. This enables me to use the G3 while Shelly is using the iBook, even though there is no *Airport* card in the G3. Of course, we are limited to the length of the cable but since I never move the desktop mini tower, it doesn't matter. My granddaughter, who has a similar set up in her own home in Virginia, has a 40-foot cable which limits her somewhat, but she moves her old 1400 portable within that distance. By the way, if someone should dare to bring it up, this connection can be used by a non-Mac.

## TIP!

### Fast printing in Quark:

To speed up your print time when printing a proof of a document with pictures, choose *Low Resolution* or *Rough* from the *Output* pop-up menu in the *Print Dialog Box* > *Options* tab. When *Low Resolution* is selected, the 72 DPI previews of the pictures are printed instead of the high-resolution images themselves. When *Rough* is selected, a box with an "X" prints in place of the picture, and complex frames print as simple ones.
