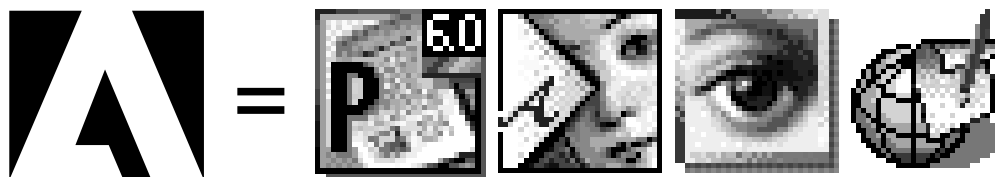

May's Meeting: Adobe= Internet Authoring at LIMac

The May meeting of LIMac featured Anton Kovary of Adobe Software who highlighted the main efforts of his company. Aside from videos touting the latest versions of *Illustrator* and *PageMaker* he spoke at length about the Internet-oriented authoring products produced by his company.

Adobe started with *Adobe Acrobat* which creates and reads PDF (Portable Digital) files to help deliver information to many users who might not share the same word processing programs.

Adobe PageMill is designed for non-technical people who still want to be able to create their own Web pages without dealing directly with HTML language (Hypertext). A graphic interface lets beginners easily create links between pages, drag and drop images and text, and toggle between *Edit* and *Preview*

Modes. More sophisticated users can upgrade to *Adobe SiteMill*, an advanced site management software with more features than *PageMill*, that automatically maintains correct links throughout a web site, while allowing you to grow and restructure at the same time.

On a more familiar note Mr. Kovary introduced *Adobe PhotoDeluxe*, a sort of *PhotoShop Light*, to answer the needs of the growing number of users of digital photography who don't have the time, money or motivation to learn a complicated program like *PhotoShop*, but who still want to put together their own photo albums.

LIMac members may be interested in my attempts to "graduate" from AOL and sign on to an internet service provider. After LINet's presentation during the April meeting and offer of a free trial, I logged on to the number given but could not communicate with LINet. I sent a query via e-mail. I received two different sets of instructions, neither of which worked. I telephoned LINet and a tech rep insisted I was entering info on my numeric key-

board, even though I told him my problem was that I couldn't enter any information. I made a special effort to see LINet at LI Internet Fair, SUNY Farmingdale. The rep said my problem would be easily solved if I used a Mac disk, but he was out of them; I should call the office to get one. I called the office and was told that the LINet person at the fair (with whom I had spoken face to face) had misled me. I gave up on LINet.

Later I was attracted to a mailing from IDT

Internet saying IDT pays special attention to Mac users. IDT's offer, accompanied with a \$19.95 check made out to my name, is flat fee of \$19.95 per month for unlimited time - pay first month, get second month free. I called. After the rep got my credit card number from me, he insisted that what I need is their special service for \$29.95 monthly. We went back and forth. I said I was only interested in the \$19.95 offer. He said I was refusing sound advice. I finally asked him to cancel the entire transaction. I almost fell prey

to the old "bait and switch" routine. Cross IDT off the list.

I'm curious to know whether any members were able to take advantage of LINet's offer and, if so, how they signed on; and also if anyone who got the IDT mailing was actually able to sign on for \$19.95. All the providers knock AOL, but AOL sure makes it easy, and AOL doesn't play games with you.

The "Bring Learning Home" bundle promotion (Performa 6116CD & Stylewriter 1200) Apple had with Sears has been a huge success. At the same time the retail channel has been hit with news regarding the recall of a number of Macintosh models. Amelio's address to the developers conference, when he outlined Apple's future plans, has received a wait-and-see response from most observers.

As per this new reorganization, there would be four divisions - the traditional hardware and software operations plus two enterprises focused on the Internet and devices costing under \$1000 such as Newton & Pippin. If Lisa was the forerunner to the Macintosh, what will Newton's successor be like? It also appears that we are going to see more Mac clones in the future. Apple is also having a promotional tie-in with the release of the movie "Mission Impossible." You can win the actual PowerBook used in this movie by playing an espionage game on the Internet. I think Apple's ability to bounce back is Mission Possible and Mission Likely. LIMac is exploring new areas to better serve our members. Technical Corner

🍏 I installed a 32MB RAM SIMM on my Performa 638CD, but it does not seem to register?

The Performa 638 has just one DRAM SIMM socket (and no VRAM). There is 4MB soldered to the motherboard. If you had more than 4MB before, then a SIMM had to have been removed. Since the P638 only needs 80ns DRAM, then speed doesn't matter, since this is the slowest they made. If the SIMM wasn't damaged before or after installation, make sure the SIMM is properly installed on the logic board. It should only fit the socket properly one way, and click into place with the holes at each end filled by a stubby little post. The SIMM socket is the leftmost long socket when viewing the motherboard with the SCSI connector towards you. Maybe you mixed up the old SIMM with the new one? Could you have tried putting the new SIMM in the ROM SIMM socket to the right of the RAM SIMM socket? If you did, it wouldn't show up in *About the Finder*. I would have thought a blunder like that would have caused the Mac to fail its startup test.

🍏 I am using a 13" RGB Monitor with my Power Book 520C and after 6 to 8 hours I get a message that my battery is drained even though I am using my AC adapter?

If the AC adapter is working correctly it may be that you have bad monitor connectors. The PB500 series won't work with an external monitor on solely battery power. It must use the AC adapter due to the power drain of the video circuitry to drive the external monitor. You may want to reset the *Power Manager*.

🍏 I am having trouble printing after using *Word* templates.

Are you using the latest version of the appropriate printer driver and *Microsoft Word*? Templates and regular *Word* documents are saved with *Page Setup* information embedded. I would suggest opening the template and doing a *Page Setup* and make sure all the settings and options are set as you want them and save the now untitled document with the same name as the template as a *Template* format in the same folder as the original. Then do a test by opening the revised template and printing. This probably will clean up your problem. By the

What's in your System Folder?

General Controls.

They set a number of overall system parameters including Desktop hiding; Launcher visibility at startup; folder protection so that files in the System and/or Applications folders cannot be thrown away; the rate that the insertion point blinks; how many times a menu selection will blink when selected; and which default folder will appear in the Save Dialog box. It will also optionally alert you if you have just started up after a crash or some other incorrect way of turning off the computer.

Macintosh Easy Open.

The extension that enables you to open a document when you don't have the application that created it. It adds to the invisible Desktop files the information that your applications present about what file formats they can open. In operation, it presents you with a dialog box when you open an unknown file format document, offering you choices of application that can open and convert the file. You will notice that the Kind information in the Finder will be more specific. —Bradley

way, HP recently revised their print drivers again. DeskWriter series 600 users should use version 8.1 and DeskJet series 800 should be using version 8.0. The older models should use version 6.0.3. All HP users should also replace their *HP Background* with the even newer version 4.0.6. Apple's latest *LaserWriter 8* is version 8.3.3 which comes with the *System 7.5 update 2.0* or *System 7.5.3*. The version 8.3.2 with the *Desktop Printing Software* version 1.0.3 is available separately. Apple's *Color StyleWriter 2400* driver is up to version 2.1.2. The *StyleWriter 1200* driver is up to version 2.1.2 also. It supports the older *StyleWriter* and *StyleWriter II* models.

What version of the System software should I install on a Mac Plus?

Probably a version of *System 6*, 6.0.5 or 6.0.7. If you have only 1 or 2MB of RAM, stick with *System 6.0.x*. If you have 4MB you could try 7.1 with *System update 3.0*. RAM gets even tighter with 7.5.1, but it is doable. If you are on a network and sharing a laser printer with others who may be using *System 7* or higher, use *System 6.0.7* with *LaserWriter 7.1* and don't forget the *Laser Prep* and *PrintMonitor*. They can be installed from the *Printing* disk from *System 7.1*.

What is the best way to rebuild the Desktop?

Use *Tech Tool v1.0.9*, a free program from Micromat Computer Systems that is downloadable which can not only do a rebuild of your invisible Desktop files, but it also can zap your *Parameter RAM*. If you can't get it, the way to do it is this:

If you are not using Apple's *Macintosh Easy Open*, restart your Macintosh with the *Shift* key down until you see the dialog box indicating *Welcome to Macintosh. Extensions off*. Then quickly switch to holding down both the *Option* and the *Command* key (That's the one with the cloverleaf symbol on it).

If you do use MEO, use an extension manager to disable all of your extensions and control panels except MEO. If you do not have an extension manager, make two new folders on your desktop and drag all your system extensions to one, and all but *Macintosh Easy Open* of your control panels to the other. Then restart and hold down both the *Option* and the

Command keys. MEO's latest version is 1.1.2.

Keep those keys down until you see a new dialog box asking if you want to rebuild the desktop file on your hard drive. You can release the keys and click the button to rebuild. If you have more than one disk or partition available to your Mac at startup it will ask you for each one. If you disabled your extensions/control panels with an extension manager, reset it to your usual standard set. If you manually dragged them out, put them back in. After the Mac is finished, restart the Mac again to run your usual collection.

What is Apple Backup?

Apple Backup is a very simple program included with Performas to make it easy for users to backup all the files on the hard drive onto a set of floppies. It is bare bones and doesn't support removable drives like a Zip or a SyQuest. The Zip comes with a better package. I would rather recommend one of the products from Dantz: *DiskFit Direct* is cheap, *DiskFit Pro* adds better features and options and *Retrospect* is the best. Since Performa's don't come with *System* disks nor installation disks for the bundled and pre-installed software (usually out of date anyway) you need to back up the hard disk when something goes wrong.

Is MacEKG a good diagnostic program?

In a word **no**. If you are looking for a thorough hardware testing program, look at Apple's *Personal Diagnostic 1.1.3* or Micromat's new *TechTool Pro 1.0.1*. *MacEKG*'s main purpose is to benchmark the speed of your Mac via a quick test as it starts up. It then compares the current test result with the previous. In this way you can determine if your new set of extensions and control panels is slowing down your Mac's operation. You can get a free benchmark program and do this yourself and save your money. Try *MacBench 3.0* or *Speedometer 4.02*. It is less automatic than *MacEKG* though. By the way you may recall the discontinued Maxa's *Snooper* (last version was 2.0.6 or *Peace of Mind*, were pretty good hardware testers, but don't support the newer Macs. *Snooper* for example, doesn't work right on the Power Macs. ■

Every once in a while, it is a good idea to do a *Save As* from the *File* menu of the document you are working on. This can dramatically reduce the file size on your hard disk. This also works in *QuarkXPress*.

Dylan Disk: A Review

Bob Dylan: Highway 61 Interactive CD.

I loved it, to say the least. I was glued to my computer for hours taking a multimedia journey you won't believe or forget! Travel along the three decades of Bob Dylan's music and messages. Treat yourself to never-before seen footage of Dylan and many other celebrities who appear throughout the disc, as well as a never-before-released electric version of "House of the Rising Sun;" all playable on your Audio CD player. Part rockumentary, part explorium, part reference and history lesson, this hybrid CD-ROM pushes the limits of imagination and technology and is guaranteed to keep your attention. My favorite stops along the journey were the hyper-real, fully navigable 3-D environments: The streets of Greenwich Village, back stage celebrity dressing rooms, the coffee houses, and of course, The Supper Club were among the best. An artist of the magnitude and importance of Bob Dylan comes along only once in a generation. Be a part of this virtual world, including a complete database of all Dylan's albums, songs, lyrics, and liner notes; even drawings done by Dylan, and a scrapbook full of priceless photos from his life. If you are a Dylan fan, this is a must have for your CD library. But if you are not a fan after this CD, you will be. The main collage is both a starting and reference point for this interactive wonderland, and is full of objects including morphs, animations, and sound recordings. Many of the pieces will take you to three-dimensional environments, interactive libraries and even videos.

Meet Bob Dylan on Highway 61 Interactive. The journey awaits and it won't be the same without you. This CD is available from the Graphix Zone (800) 828-3838. Tell them you read about it in the LIMac FORUM. ■

SIMPLE: An acronym for *Sheer Idiot's Monopurpose Programming Language Environment*. This language, developed at the Hanover College for Technological Misfits, was designed to make it impossible to write code with errors in it. The statements are, therefore, confined to *Begin*, *End* and *Stop*. No matter how you arrange the statements, you can't make a syntax error. Programs written in SIMPLE do nothing useful.

QBPro Revisited

Several months ago I reviewed *QuickBooks Pro 3.1* for the LIMac FORUM. Since then Intuit has shipped version 4.0 of *QuickBooks Pro*. I'm always a bit leery of upgrades to an already good program because sometimes these upgrades are more akin to degrades; witness what Microsoft did with its degrade of *Word 5* to *Word 6*. Happily that is not the case here. Intuit took a good product and built on it by adding many features that **users** wanted. When I reviewed version 3.1, I noted that it would be nice if *QB Pro* were cross platform compatible with the Windows version of the program. It is. I noted that it would also be useful to have the ability to "fit" the report to a page(s). It does. I asked for more pre-defined reports and forms to be built in. It delivers with income tax reports that generate line item totals for tax forms such as 1065 (partnership), 1120 (corporation), etc. Now, if we could only export this information into Intuit's line of tax preparation packages we would really have a winner here. Also included in 4.0 is the ability to print forms 940 and 941 and 1099s. *QB4.0* also gives the user the ability to create custom fields for customers, vendors, employees and inventory items. Intuit added an *Easy Start-Up* interview module, that asks a series of questions and serves to guide the user through the initial set up procedure. This process is not unlike the *Easy Step Process* that can be found in Intuit's *MacInTax* product line. I imagine that it can be useful to someone new to computerized accounting. I found that bypassing the *Easy Start-Up* procedure was faster, but inexperienced users should probably use *Easy Start-Up*, as it offers many useful tips along the way. Intuit has also, provided custom documentation for a variety of industries that will help the user get the most out of *QB4.0* by optimizing the product for their type of business. There is a feature in the 4.0 version that I find especially useful: *Search* can be filtered by any combination of date, type, number, name, source, account, memo, amount. I found that if I can't find what I'm looking for, the reason is that it's not there. The new find feature is truly remarkable. Good job Intuit. Are you still listening? How about a multi-user capability with the next version of this product. *And*, oh yes, **please** upgrade and don't degrade. ■

Placing the proper emphasis: Don't emphasize information in text by underlining. That's for typewriters, and you're *setting type* on a computer. Try these methods:

- ▶ *Italicize*
- ▶ **Bold Type**
- ▶ **Different Font**
- ▶ Space Away
- ▶ **A Different Color**

If you really need an underline, draw it. You can place it properly, control its weight and even make it dashed!

This month we are spotlighting utilities requested by our members during Brad's Technical Corner Q&A. LIMac #982 has the *PPPpop Utility v1.32*, which helps users of Internet services other than AOL organize their helper applications; *MacPPP Quick Keys 3.1*; *Mt. Everything*; *DiskCopy 6.0* & *ShrinkWrap 2.0* to help create disk images, *Disk Dup+ Folder* and *SCSIProbe*. Also included is *Netscape Defrost*, offered as a way to possibly avoid some freeze-ups. LIMac#983 has *Open Transport Information*, *FKKey Folder* and the often requested *TechTool v1.0.9*. LIMac#984 & 985 supply the updated *Netscape 2.01*, and LIMac#986 has *SoftwareFPU v3.03* and updates for older versions, for all those without FPU hardware built into their Macs. And LIMac#987 has the updated version of *the Factory* for those addicted to this particular game. Don't forget to take a look at our font book which may be found at the shareware table in the hall each month.

Still Worth a Second Look:

LIMac #948&949/ Acrobat Reader: Balan Nagraj's favorite which is sure to come in handy. Discussed in the Q&A column. **LIMac #947/QuickTime 2.1:** Including *Quick Time*, *Quick Time Power Plug*, and *QuickTime Musical Instruments*. Please note that *Apple Multi Media Tuner* is built into QT2.1, so that it is no longer needed as a separate file.

Remember that all disks are now offered at \$5.00 each and are available by mail (with no mailing charges).

TIP!

Rebuild your Desktop at least once a month. Hold down *Command-Option* when you start your Mac. When you see the dialog asking if you would like to rebuild your *Desktop*, click *OK*. This will keep all of your icons displaying properly and help speed up your Mac. Even better, use the shareware application *TechTool v1.0.9* to force your Mac to delete your *Desktop* file and immediately rebuild a new, uncorrupted file.
