May's Meeting

The May meeting which featured Macromedia's *Freehand 8* was presented by Sandee Cohen, an independent consultant and author associated with Macromedia and graphics publishers – and one of the finest speakers that we have had to date. Sandee showed some of the outstanding features of the redesigned Freehand which was for many years a runner-up to Illustrator.

Freehand 8 offers precision vector drawing and typography, as well as animation, and boasts an innovative transparency lens which allows for some amazing effects.

Its versatility is highlighted by ability to import and export a very large group of file formats, including *Photoshop*, *Illustrator*, DXF, *CorelDRAW* GIF, JPEG, etc. On a comparison chart, this application seems to challenge both Adobe *Illustrator* and *CorelDRAW* handily.

In addition to *Freehand 8*, Sandee took us through a tour of Macromedia *Fireworks*, which creates GIFs, JPEGs and animated GIFs. She not only demonstrated complete mastery of the programs, but was an engaging and highly competent speaker.


Well, here we are waiting for Blue and Yellow Boxes – Apple is at it again. An all-in-one computer based on another awesome chip, the G3.

Technical Corner

► I get a Recovered Items folder in my Trash, and I can't delete it.

Restart with *Extensions* off and hold down the *Option* key and empty the *Trash*. If it won't empty, run *Norton Disk Doctor* and try again. Your Mac must have crashed while running some program that puts temporary files in the *Trash*. It will reappear until you restart.

► PowerMac G3 running OS 8.1 on a LocalTalk network. It won't see any other Macs on the network at startup, and after a few restarts, it will see them.

Throw away the *LocalTalk PCI* Extension. It's new to *OS 8.1* and it was supposed to improve performance, but it usually causes problems.

► My Chooser keeps defaulting to the Modem port instead of the Printer port where I have my Epson Stylus color printer. I have to reset it every time I boot up.

Use Apple's *ImageWriter Driver* – install it, or enable it if you have tuned it off in your *Extensions Manager*. In the *Chooser*, select *ImageWriter* on the left, then select *printer port* on the right. Close the *Chooser*. This will set the PRAM to use the *printer port* – something Epson's software fails to do. Then open the *Chooser* again, select the *Stylus Color (EX)*

TIP!

PageMaker 6.5 Egg:

Hold down the **Command** key while clicking on *About PageMaker*. A dialog box will appear that displays a list of installed components such as *Plug-Ins*, *Import Filters* and localized *Languages*.

TIP!

Using Netscape Navigator to view hard disk contents:

You can drop your Hard Disk icon onto the *Netscape* window and have an extremely clear access to files and folders on the disk. This trick is especially valuable for Macs with multiple users or large number of folders. And any file (with an assigned application in the *Netscape Preferences*) could be viewed directly and very efficiently. GIFS and JPEGS may also be viewed.

Driver and the *Printer* port, close the *Chooser* and everything will be fine, even after you turn off your computer. You may want to upgrade your software. Follow the Epson Software update link on the *Websites of Interest* page on the LIMac Website.

▶ *Costar* software can't find the printer through an A/B switch on the *Modem* port.

The *Costar* is rather particular. Try not using the A/B switch. Try a simplified Extension set, there may be something locking up the *Modem* port, like fax software, for example.

▶ How does one network the PC side of a Mac with a DOS card? *LocalTalk*?

The DOS card supports multinode support for simultaneous network connection using Novell *NetWare IPX/SPX*, *TCP/IP*, and *NETBEUI* protocols via the *Ethernet* connection. You cannot network from the PC side via *LocalTalk*. You can connect to and print through the *MacOS*, to an Adobe *Postscript* laser printer via the *Ethernet* or *LocalTalk/PhoneNET* connections.

▶ Is Apple introducing a new cheaper G3 model? I heard something recently.

Apple introduced, and will ship in August, the iMac. For \$1299, it has a 233MHz G3 processor, 512K Backside Cache at 117MHz, 32MB of RAM (upgradable), 4G IDE Hard Drive, 24x max. CD-ROM, 2MB SGRAM (upgradable), 2 USB (Universal Serial Bus) 12Mbps ports for the Keyboard and Mouse. In a new twist, it has no Floppy drive, no SCSI port and no PCI expansion slots. It comes with a built-in 15" monitor in a transparent blue and white case. Steve Jobs said the iMac's rear looks better than some WinTel machine's front. It does come with 10/100 Mbps *Ethernet* and an internal *Modem* (Should be 56K V.90 when it ships). It has surround sound stereo speakers too. It comes with *AppleWorks* (Formerly known as *ClarisWorks*). USB Floppy, Zip, printers and other peripherals are forthcoming from third parties. The USB connections are hot-swap and allow dozens of devices to be connected over long wires. Apple will be introducing USB on their mainstream models in the near future. The low price including display for such great performance makes the unusual design attractive to schools and network workstations. The lack of floppy and SCSI limit the

iMac's usefulness as a stand-alone computer. User data must be transferred via the Internet or a local LAN/Intranet. Apple figured nearly all software comes on CD-ROM and floppies are on the way out.

▶ Running *Mac OS 7.5.5* on a 5300/75LC. I want to *Speed Disk* it. Apparently I need an updated *Norton Utilities*. The one I have was for 7.5. I don't want to have to buy a new *Norton Utilities*.

If you do want to optimize your HD, you can purchase, at a discount from full retail, the upgrade to version 3.5.3 which comes on a CD-ROM with which you can startup your 5300. Alternately, use your *Disk Tools* floppy and the *Startup Disk Builder* program that comes with *Norton Utilities* to create a custom startup *SD Startup Disk* for your Mac. One other option would be to startup the 5300 with the bootable Apple CD-ROM and run *Speed Disk* off the distribution floppy. ■



TIP!

Photoshop 4.0

Preview Help:

In *Photoshop*, when you're making any adjustment in a dialog box with a preview window (when applying a filter, for example, you can see the unaltered, "before" image by simply clicking and holding on the preview image. When you let go, it returns to the preview.

Plug-In Sets for

Photoshop:

One way to maintain various sets of *Plug-Ins* for *Photoshop* and be able to load them for a particular job is to create a series of folders, each with a different name, and place a group of *Plug-Ins* for a particular work style or client in each one. Then, when launching *Photoshop*, hold down *Command-Option*. A dialog box will appear asking you to choose a *Plug-Ins* folder.

An alternative: use the shareware program *Plug-In Manager*, available online, that allows you to choose your *Plug-Ins* when you open any *Plug-In*-friendly program. Keep an individually labeled copy in each program - *Quark*, *Illustrator*, *Photoshop*, etc.

Sore Eyes

The cyber classroom is nearing reality with the convergence of simultaneous voice, video and data transmissions. Business organizations are leading the way. "Distance learning" is very cost effective. Databeam's Learning Server (Databeam Inc. www.databeam.com) includes tools enabling students to "raise their hands" electronically to ask questions or to contribute to the discussion. Their software can also be configured to permit a student to interrupt in a study group or even to permit a student to lead the discussion or deliver a report. For some, this alleviates the fear of public speaking.

Elementary and secondary schools and universities are exploring Internet based education as a means of eliminating some of the many problems of a face to face situation including, but not limited to, racial or gender prejudice as well as disciplinary problems at the elementary and secondary levels.

Traditional face to face instruction has its advocates for good reasons we all know, but for businesses the impetus to cyber learning is cost effectiveness. It is apparent that if a staff is scattered across the state, if not the country, hotel bills and travel costs will be substantially reduced with cyber training. A laptop and a telephone is all the equipment necessary to attend the training session, workshop, or conference. The advent of cable modems transmitting this information at greatly enhanced speed will bring the cyber class into (virtual) reality.

The CyberCampus will offer its first online degree program, a Master's in Public Administration beginning with the fall 1998 semester.

Apparently the future is now. ■

User Group News

It's that time again – Macworld.

The User Group Survey Results Online
 Apple recently completed a User Group Online Survey and I want to share some of the results with you. 2000 people participated, from around the world. The following information comes from Brigid Brady-de Lambert, Apple User Group Program Manager. This survey focused on collecting some indication of where user group members were in what marketing folks call the "upgrade cycle"—what computers they were currently using, when they had last upgraded their hardware and their *Mac OS*. Here's a brief recap of some of the over-riding themes. We have to take into consideration that the results are probably biased slightly toward upper end users that have internet access, but nonetheless these results confirm my belief that user group members are early adopters of new technology, and on the ball.

- ▶ Most (53%) reported owning 1-2 computers.
- ▶ 65% are using *Mac OS 8.0* or *8.1*
- ▶ 52% have purchased a new computer within the past year, and
- ▶ 76% have purchased a new computer within the past two years! ■
