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September's Meeting



Scott Travers gave an engaging demonstration of the new *Microsoft Office:Mac 2001*.

Scott spent most of his time highlighting the new member of the Office suite – *Entourage 2001*, the new address book, calendar and task manager. Very cool how you can link e-mail and Web pages to contacts and bring up a Web-based map to any address. The usual alerts are there, and you can easily convert from *Now Up-To-Date/Contact* or *Personal Organizer*. Your old favorites from *MS Office* have been enhanced to be more Mac-like and take better advantage of *Mac OS* functions. The *AppleWorks*-inspired *Project Gallery* offers task-oriented choices for you to be led to content creation. The context-sensitive *Formatting Palette* makes better use of screen real estate with collapsible sections. *PowerPoint* now uses *QuickTime* effects and can save a presentation in *QuickTime* format. *Excel's* list or database prowess has been improved to make common tasks child's play. There is the new *Data Merge Manager* for easy mail or e-mail merge, going beyond the new linked *Contacts Toolbar* available from *Word 2001*. *Office 2001* Macintosh edition comes in a case that you can use to store other CDs. There is no printed manual, just a big *Adobe Acrobat* file. You should be able to upgrade by October 11. Scott didn't have the upgrade pricing, but the mail order catalogs seem to be asking \$270. If you bought *Office '98* or any *Office '98* element after July 18, you're entitled to a nearly-free upgrade to 2001. You just have to pay \$7.50 shipping and sales tax. System requirements: A Power Mac running *Mac OS 8.1 – Mac OS 8.5* or newer is recommended. At least a 120MHz processor and a minimum of 32MB of RAM and 160MB Hard Drive space. Figure more RAM and plenty of disk space for typical users. All in all, it was an interesting, informative presentation.



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**Graphic Converter:***A Review*

Out of all the shareware utilities for graphics, *Graphic Converter* reigns at the top. Developed by Lemke Software *Graphic Converter* does what it says, and converts graphic formats from one file type another. You can also edit graphic files in the program using the provided tool palette. You can also add many affects

such as distiller by using the *Effect* menu.

In my opinion, the most important feature of *Graphic Converter* is batch conversions. As a Web-master, I really depend on this feature. To use this feature, you go to the *File* menu and choose *Convert More*, and select a group of files to convert. After the conversion starts, you just sit back and relax while the software does all the work for you.

Graphic Converter may not be nearly as powerful as *Adobe PhotoShop*, but with features such as filters and the support for plug-ins, *Graphic Converter* really holds its own. *Graphic Converter* also lets you get a lot done with less than half the RAM of its *Adobe* counterpart. If you're just getting started in the world of graphics, and don't want to spend \$300 on *PhotoShop* get a copy of *Graphic*

Converter.

Book Review

Adobe PhotoShop 5.5 Classroom in a Book.

The original Macintosh computer, circa 1980, was advertised as a computer that would let you be an artist with no real ability. Of course, if you had an artist's eye you would be able to do spectacular things. Adobe's latest text and tutorial for *PhotoShop 5.5* and *ImageReady*, *Adobe PhotoShop Classroom in a Book*, is an excellent tutorial. It will definitely enhance your own capabilities.

We found it necessary to spend considerably more time than the text suggests, but keeping at it made it possible to produce some wonderful things. Suggestions appear in the middle of a project and the lessons need not all be done to the same degree of perfection. In fact, we found some much more difficult to accomplish. It is important to try them, however, and at least get to understand the vocabulary of each lesson, before going on to the next one.

The text covers the production of both print and Web documents, with clearer explanations than we have seen anywhere else.

This book (and its CD) goes much further than we were able to go, but nevertheless, it seems to be a worthwhile addition to any Mac users library – and something to keep one out of trouble for quite a while! ↴



Technical Corner

► **Will installing Norton Utilities 5.0 overwrite version 4.0?**

No. You should first delete the *Norton Utilities* folder and the *Preferences* and the *Norton FileSaver* and *Norton FileSaver Assistant* before installing the *version 5*. Afterwards, delete the *DiskLight Control Panel* – it's more trouble than it's worth. Also, allocate 24K more memory to the *Norton FileSaver Assistant*. Very few totally new versions of any software replace the previous full release; only most updaters to new sub-versions replace the old. All too often, the preferences for a previous release will cause problems for the current release. One of the good reasons to hang onto installer logs is to find out what to throw out when updating.

► **I've signed up with Optimum Online, but the home page is theirs. How do I change it? I'm using Netscape Communicator.**

Go to the *Edit* menu, select *Preferences...*, the window should appear with the correct category showing. (It's the *Navigator* category.) You can type in a preferred URL here, or if the currently showing Web page is your preferred home page, you can just click the *Use Current Page* button. We suggest using <http://www2.limac.org/limac/index.html>.

► **I have a System 7.5.1 Performa 6205 with 40MB of RAM. If I upgrade to Mac OS 8.1, will I loose any applications?**

Probably, yes. The programs themselves will still be there, but they may no longer work. Perhaps more importantly, your Mac may no longer startup without crashing because of the *Extensions* and *Control Panels* besides the Apple operating system that needs upgrading or removal to work with *Mac OS 8.1*. You should obtain upgrades to all of these before upgrading the operating system. Some items have been discontinued, so you'll have to either do without, or find substitutes. This warning applies to the extras that Apple included as well as anything else you may have added. At least your Express Modem should still work under *OS 8.1*. It wouldn't under *OS 8.5* or newer. Have you considered selling the Performa and buying an iMac instead?

► **Is there an easy way to send a picture from a non-AOL user to an AOL user?**

Save the picture as a *JPEG* format file (RGB

Elements of Design:

Two Is Not Better Than One!

Repeat after me... "One space after a period. One space after a period." Got it?

The Mac is not a typewriter. With few exceptions, fonts on a computer are proportional fonts, meaning that an "l" takes less physical room than an "m." The space you type when you hit the Spacebar is preset to leave the correct amount of space between sentences for that particular font. Two spaces leaves too much, forcing the eye to jump to the start of the next sentence, and actually slows down reading.

If you just can't get over the two-space habit, do a global search on the document and replace all double spaces with single spaces.

Data Recovery



Apple made an announcement that is sure to make more than a few Mac users happy. That announcement was that they have added renowned Macintosh author David Pogue to the growing list of features to the Apple site. According to the Apple press release Pogue will be working in the Macintosh products guide section on the Apple web site. For the time being David will be posting a guide called *Mastering Your Macintosh* that will teach Mac users how to, well maximize their Macintosh. mode, 72 dpi) and send that as an attachment to your e-mail. Do not try to include it in the body of the e-mail. The trick is the encoding method. Using *Outlook Express*, if you *Binhex* encode, the picture will come in looking like gibberish text, preceded by the notice this must be decoded with *Binhex 4*. You can save this e-mail and drag and drop it onto *StuffIt Expander* to decode. Alternately, you can encode with *AppleSingle*. The picture will be recognized as an attachment. You can then click *Download Now*, save the file and a preview window will appear with the picture. Using *Communicator*, the default MIME encode works fine, like the *AppleSingle* from *Outlook Express* but the original file name is preserved.

► I have a Casio QV-780 digital camera that I use with the video in card on my Performa 6500. Can I use this camera with a digital port?

The camera stores its 640x480 pictures on a Compact flash card as well as the so called *Digital In/Out* port. You can read the images with the supplied software (QV-Link) in TIFF, PICT or JPEG format. The camera also works through Adobe *PhotoDeluxe* and *QV Plug-in 3.1*. You just use the SB155 QV to PC communications cable with the Mini-Din 8 adapter into your Mac *Printer* port. You may have to turn off *AppleTalk* to use your *Printer* port. (The *Modem* port is capped) Otherwise you can use a SCSI CompactFlash card reader to read the little cards you put in the camera. The camera supports up to 64MB cards. Seven *Fine* quality images per megabyte.

► I just bought a new iMac DV (indigo). If I extend my warranty with an AppleCare contract, do I still have to pay a service provider and pass on my contract number?

No. If you pay for a service contract, you just need to advise the service provider of your contract number. They will confirm with Apple and not bill you for covered repairs for the duration of the contract. Now if you damage the computer by not taking proper care of it (say you dropped it onto a concrete floor), you'll have violated the contract

and then you will have to pay for repairs. Also, if you don't give the service provider the AppleCare contract number, they will want to bill you, since they didn't know to check if this iMac was covered by an extended contract. If you bring it in for repair during the first year, bring your dated sales receipt, so they will know it's covered by the standard one year repair period. As for tech support, the standard free 90-day period does not start the day you buy the Mac. It starts when you first call with a problem. They will give you a tech support case number that you can refer to for the rest of the 90 days. If you have two independent tech support questions during the 90-day period, refer to the case number given you. One hardware related problem that you may cause yourself is the new slot loading drive cannot handle the business card sized CD-ROM discs you may see. I see them in CompUSA at the register as PokeROM and many vendors sell recordable disks and labeling kits for these discs. The eject mechanism cannot engage these discs and they become lodged in your CD- or DVD-ROM drive. The small 120mm round CD-ROM discs are OK, but the squared-off version is trouble.

► Can you talk about powered versus un-powered USB hubs?

You almost always want a powered hub. That is one that comes with a little AC adapter. The powered hub supplies power to connected USB devices rather than letting them draw power from the USB port on the Mac's motherboard. This almost always causes many problems as most devices draw too much for the Apple design. Keep the keyboard and mouse on port two and use a powered hub on port one with everything else plugged in there. Some new monitors have USB hubs within them. The only time you might use a non-powered hub, is with a laptop. There are a couple of mini-hubs out there that are non-powered for smallest size and weight. Sometimes it's best to have the hub's input USB cable unplugged during startup to avoid problems. Plug it back in when the *Finder* loads. Various USB related problems require a *System Software* or *Firmware* update to resolve. *Mac OS 9* users can use the *Software Update Control Panel*. ↵

We accomplished this by giving assorted items to our grandchildren and children, who were delighted to have them. Duplicate text with the Option key:

A speedy alternative to using *Cut-and-Paste* commands to duplicate highlighted text (if the application you are using doesn't support *Drag-and-Drop*): Just press the *Option* key while dragging the selection. The duplicate appears wherever you release the mouse.
